Reflection for All Saints Day

Psalm 34:22

The Lord redeems the life of his servants; none of those who take refuge in him will be condemned.

On this All Saints Day I find myself looking back over the privileged years of ministry that have been my lot in life. There is a nice symmetry about my experiences. My first ministry was as assistant to the Reverend L. Farquhar Gunn where my role was to work with the youth. The church in question was St. Andrew's Gardiner. My retirement parish was another St. Andrew's, Box Hill. And now I find myself again filling a role of ministry preparing weekly services on-line for St. Andrew's Box hill. A swan song, surely!

Looking back I remember a ministry at St. Cuthbert's Lorne and how that was special because my family spent very happy summers there as teenagers and still see St Cuthbert's and Lorne as a special place for them, the more so now as the ashes of June's parents -their grandparents- and Coral, June's sistertheir aunt- are in the Memorial Garden there. It is a sacred place that they visit quite often in their adult lives.

In the years that I was privileged to engage in study at Oxford the high point was actually living in St. Cross College as a Visiting Fellow, during Michaelmas Term, a time of very special memories for myself and for June as it enabled her to engage in wonderful music experiences with access to various chapels in Oxford and their pipe organs.

And now life has taken an unexpected turn towards saintly experience! The saints of old were wont to withdraw into isolation to focus their faith practice and commitment without distractions from the everyday world. I now find myself reflecting in isolation on the meaning and practice of faith and ministry in Covid isolation. And the insights and perspectives of faith continue to draw me on into the world of the sacred and remind me that the rampant secularism of modernity has been shaken to its very core as the previously

unshaken confidence in materialism and science to offer all the answers to life's meaning and purpose have lost their hold. The spirituality of the saints of old has reclaimed its place in the quest for ultimate meaning and purpose.

See what kind of love the Father has given to us, that we should be called children of God; and so we are. The reason why the world does not know us is that it did not know him. Beloved, we are God's children now, and what we will be has not yet appeared; but we know that when he appears we shall be like him, because we shall see him as he is. And everyone who thus hopes in him purifies himself as he is pure. 1 John 3:1-3

The birth of Jesus and the Sacrament of Communion - which we would today be celebrating together if circumstances were different- still has the power to draw us into Christ's life and the ultimate realisation of faith as the call of humankind into life in all its fulness.

Oh, taste and see that the Lord is good!

Blessed is the one who takes refuge in him! Psalm 34:8

Reflection

Sainthood and piety, a dangerous mix indeed as the gospel reading reminds us. And this is especially the case when they are carefully manufactured for all to see. For saintliness is the gift of God to the faithful, not the right of those who see themselves as such and demand to be seen as such.

In my school chaplaincy days I was expected to project a different image than that of other members of staff. The most flattering moments came when others saw past the prescribed image and responded to me as a real person

I well remember how a former student rang me one day to ask me to conduct his marriage ceremony. It was a surprise because I had often had run-ins with him at school and so felt less than enthusiastic at the request even to the point that I actually felt duty bound to be up front and indicate my reservation. "I always thought you hated my guts, Jim", I said. Unfazed, he responded "You are right there", he said, "but I always felt that you were fair dinkum and someone I would trust if I really needed you. I am not much of a believer but I want my marriage to be real and you will make that so". Later he was to ring me to ask me to baptise his son and I said that this could only happen if he were attending a church and that church's minister agreed. The outcome was that the minister welcomed me to do the baptism and Jim went on to join that congregation and become one of its leaders. A humbling experience for me indeed, but also a reminder of the danger of misjudging people when, if we are truly to be faithful, then we must leave any judging of others to God.

Prayers for Ourselves and Others and Lord's Prayer

O God, our God, narrow the distance between who we are and who we hope to be. Enlarge our life so that it is earthed in authenticity and coloured bright with realism.

Give us faithfulness which stays the course without expecting any reward.

Give us humble hope when all around seems daunting or confusing. We pray especially for those who challenge us because they see things differently.

We ask that we may be inspired to give such as these more than that which they ask of us.

Walk with us, O Christ. Make us as loving as you are and never leave us alone, Holy Spirit. This we pray in faith and humility as we share in the prayer which Jesus himself taught us

Our Father in heaven,
hallowed be your name,
your kingdom come,
your will be done,
on earth as in heaven.
Give us today our daily bread.
Forgive us our sins
as we forgive those who sin against us.
Save us from the time of trial
and deliver us from evil.
For the kingdom, the power, and the glory are yours
